

1977 — Trouble begins with reports of Peoples Temple members' mis-treatment and a custody battle over a temple child. Jim plans to move with a majority of the congregation to Jonestown. By September, nearly

1,000 have migrated.

1978 — In Jonestown, Jim Jones begins the "White Night" suicide drills and talks about threats to the church. The Concerned Relatives band together and gain the ear of U.S. Rep. Leo Ryan of California.

A story with area roots It began in the tiny Ran-dolph County town of Crete, with the birth on May 13, 1931, of James "Jim" Warren Jones to Lynetta and James Thurman Jones. He was their only child.

School records show that little Jimmy Jones' dad was employed by the Works Progress Administration, as foreman for community sanitation and as a truck driver.
